Traction is attained via deep treads, making it suitable for rough and uneven ground. Solid Tires Outside industrial applications and indoor locations use solid tires. Solid rubber tires function similar to pneumatic tires when they are punctured and are safe from blowouts. Since these tires are not filled with air, they don't provide the same cushion attributes. Rough terrain areas cannot rely on these tires. Certain solid tires are made with sidewall holes to provide a smoother ride. One of the main problems with this type of tire construction is that it offers less capacity for forklift load carrying. Polyurethane Tires Polyurethane tires are suitable for indoor places including warehouse applications that generally last longer than rubber tires. Polyurethane offers a much higher load capacity compared to a rubber tire. In order to compensate for the additional battery weight, electric forklifts rely on polyurethane tires. The additional battery life is an extra benefit thanks to the lower rolling resistance offered by this type of tire. There are numerous power sources for forklifts. Forklifts can use diesel, LP gas, battery power, liquid propane or gas to run. Since it is a clean-burning fuel, LP is preferred for many applications. There are certain facilities that maintain large liquid propane storage on site to enable forklift refueling convenience. Additional locations have extra liquid propane cylinders to allow changing during the refueling process. Of course, specific precautions need to be taken while the LP cylinder is being changed. It is vital that safety glasses, strong gloves and goggles need to be used. Before the tank is changed out, the ignition needs to be shut off. Turning the cylinder valve tight closes the hose connection and it can be loosened with ones' hand. Remember that the valve will turn in the opposite direction of a regular connection. Don't use any metal tool such as a wrench for connections that have been designed to be tightened by hand. Next, remove the restraining straps from the cylinder to enable it to be lifted free from the bracket and replace the empty cylinder with a full one. Always dispose of the empty cylinder by placing it in the properly designated location. Remember, full cylinders are heavy. Secure the hose connection to the new tank with your hand and ensure the seal is secured and tight. Next, turn the cylinder valve on slowly. After the valve has been turned on, ensure there are no leaks by listening closely. Turn the valve off immediately if any leak is detected and recheck all of the hose connections. There are a variety of applications for interior and exterior forklifts. Different models are excellent for outdoor construction site locations and rough terrain or interior areas. Warehouse forklift units utilize smooth, flat surfaces. There are different forklift classes; higher classes are used for outdoor work and lower classes are typically utilized in warehouse operations. The Code 1 forklift allows the operator to stand and the lift codes 4, 5 and 6 mean the units are sit down models. Lift Code 4 forklifts feature three wheels; however, lift Code 5 forklifts stand for cushion tires and lift Code 6 forklifts offer pneumatic tires. The Class 2 forklifts are the narrow aisle units that are ideal for small spaces and utilize a standing operator. These forklifts are excellent for narrow locations that can't accommodate a sit-down rider model. Class 3 forklifts or electric models are also ideal for smaller spaces. Class 3 models feature an operator that either stands or walks behind the machine. Electric forklift models are popular in interior locations and warehouses and places that cannot use IC or internal combustion units. Electric models have disadvantages and advantages. They can last longer and are considered more environmental. These machines have better noise pollution reduction which is a huge asset for interior locations. Their upkeep costs are less overall as well. Electric models cost more money and cannot be used in lousy weather.
